This toolkit contains a set of resources to support Membership Guides in the TESOL International Association's New Member Welcome Program. The first section provides an overview of the program. The second section offers models of communication between the Guide and the new member. The final section includes information on association resources that can be shared with the new member to facilitate engagement.

## Part 1: Overview of the New Member Welcome Program

Thank you for your willingness to serve as a Membership Guide in TESOL International Association's New Member Welcome Program! The purpose of the New Member Welcome Program is to integrate new members into the TESOL International Association. This is accomplished by connecting new members with established members (a.k.a., Membership Guides) with the goal of:

- Involving new members in Association events and activities;
- Helping new members maximize their use of membership benefits;
- Developing new members' professional network;
- Fostering member engagement and retention.

The participants in the New Member Welcome Program are new members who have joined the TESOL International Association within the past month. They represent the full spectrum of TESOL membership: all genders, all age ranges, from countries around the world, and having varying levels of professional experience. They can also belong to any membership category:

Professional	The most general category of membership.
Lower Income Professional	For those who earn less than \$25,000 USD annually.
New Professional	For those who have been teaching for less than three years.
Global Professional	For residents of countries with a gross national income of less than \$15,000 as defined by the World Bank.
TESOL Student	For those who are at least half time at a degree-granting institution (does not include certificate programs).
TESOL Retired Professional	For retired professionals who have been TESOL members for five of the past ten years.

The Membership Guides (you!) are established members of the TESOL International Association who are knowledgeable about its activities, communities, and resources.

#### Membership Guides:

- Have been a member of the TESOL International Association for at least 3 years.
- Have attended at least one annual convention, virtually or in person.

• Has been involved in an Interest Section, Professional Learning Network, Professional Council, Task Force, Committee, or other activities within the Association.

The responsibilities of the Membership Guide are to:

- Contact your new member 3-4 times during the three-month program. Communication can occur more frequently if it is the desire of the Guide and the new member. Communication can take place via e-mail, messaging apps, telephone, video conferencing, or other means convenient to both parties..
- Learn about the new member's teaching context and their professional interests. In this way, you can inform the new member about Interest Sections and Professional Learning Networks that align with their needs. You can also let the new member know about upcoming events (such as webinars) and opportunities to volunteer with the Association.
- Participate, as possible, in online or face-to-face events designed for Guides and new members to meet with each other and to interact with other TESOL members.
- Respond to requests for feedback on their Guiding experience from the Membership Professional Council.

Guides serve for 6-12 months at a time and are welcome to continue their service indefinitely. Guides can be assigned up to 3 new members in every 3-month cycle (January-March, April-June, July-September, and October-December).

## Part 2: Membership Guide-New Member Communication

The following are examples of the emails that you might send to the new member at various stages of your Guiding relationship. Guides should customize their communication to the new member. There are models for your initial communication with the new member, directing the new member to TESOL International Association resources, maintaining communication over time, and concluding the Guide-new member relationship.

## Initial Communication Example 1

Dear [New Member]:

Welcome to TESOL International Association! My name is [Guide Name]. I have volunteered to orient new members in the association, and I have been assigned as your Membership Guide. My role is to help you navigate your TESOL membership, make full use of your member benefits, and get involved! I am pleased to have this opportunity to get to know you and to support you during your first few months of membership in TESOL.

[Guides briefly share information about themselves such as where they work and what they have gained from being a member of TESOL International Association. See example below.]

[I am a teacher at ABC University in Florida in the United States. I work in an intensive English program with students from different countries who aspire to earn their degrees in the United States. I primarily teach grammar and writing to intermediate and advanced proficiency students. I have been a member of TESOL International Association for 15 years. During that time, I have connected with TESOL colleagues from around the world. I have learned a lot from the resources that TESOL offers such as webinars, newsletters, and opportunities to engage with colleagues in a wide range of online communities of practice. I have also developed my leadership skills through volunteering with the association.]

Please tell me more about yourself. What led you to become an English teacher? Where do you teach, and how long have you been teaching? What do you hope to gain from your TESOL membership?

As your Membership Guide, I will be in touch with you several times during the next three months. What is the best way for us to stay in touch (e.g., e-mail, Facebook, or other apps)? You can reach me at [email or Facebook]. You can also message me on myTESOL.

I look forward to learning more about you! Please let me know if you have any questions about the association or your membership. I am here to help!

## Initial Communication Example 2

## Other Questions to Get the Conversation Started

- What are some challenges you have recently faced as a teacher?
- What do you enjoy most about teaching English?
- Why did you want to become an English teacher?

#### For program administrators

- Tell me about your program. What levels does it encompass?
- What are your strengths as an administrator? What can you share with other TESOL members?
- What challenges does your program face?
- Did you ever have a teaching position? If yes, how did you transition to administration?

#### General

- Why did you join TESOL? Do you belong to other professional associations?
- What do you hope to gain from your TESOL membership?
- Have you joined any communities of practice within TESOL?
- What are your professional goals for the future?

## Directing the New Member to Association Resources

## Concluding the New Member Guide Relationship

#### In the Event of Non-Communication

What should you do if you contact the new member and they are non-responsive? Suppose you have followed the above guidance and written the new member two or three times but gotten no response. In that case you can simply send a concluding message saying you hope their experience with TESOL is going well and that they will benefit professionally and personally. Then send a note to Juliet Mason (<a href="mason@tesol.org">jmason@tesol.org</a>) with the new member's name and email, indicating that they did not respond.

Each of these areas can be a starting place for new member engagement. Use this information to encourage new members to connect with various aspects of TESOL and/or pass along information that you think the new member may find useful.

## **TESOL Membership Benefits**

- Encourage new members to understand all elements of their <u>TESOL</u> membership and begin to engage in various ways with their TESOL membership.
- New members will receive notices when TESOL membership is close to expiration. These emails will explain how members can renew their membership for one or two years at the current membership rates.
- Invite new members to begin engagement with the <u>myTESOL</u> community, a
  place to share, learn, and network with other professionals, by creating a
  profile.

#### **TESOL** Resource Center

- The <u>TESOL Resource Center</u> contains lesson plans, teaching tips, activities, assessment tools, and much more.
- New members can browse materials and contribute their own.

#### Communities of Practice

<u>TESOL Interest Sections</u> are groups focused on current practice and research in specific areas of English language teaching and learning. The Interest Sections publish newsletters and host webinars and networking events.

Articles enable an active and vibrant professional dialogue about research- and theory-based practices as well as practice-oriented theorizing and research.

• Individual subscriptions to <u>TESOL Quarterly</u> are available to TESOL members only. Subscriptions cost US\$59 (e-only) and US\$89 (for e- and print versions) for most members; \$45 for Global Professional members (e-only).

TESOL Quarterly (TQ), a refereed professional journal, fosters inquiry into English language teaching and learning by providing a forum for TESOL professionals to share their research findings and explore ideas and relationships in the field. TQ's readership includes ESOL teacher educators, teacher learners, researchers, applied linguists, and ESOL teachers.



TESOL has two types of COPs: Interest Sections (ISs) and Professional Learning Networks (PLNs). All COPs adhere to TESOL's mission, vision, core values, and nondiscrimination policy, and they all support TESOL's strategic vision. But each has a different structure and activities.





3. You can either click on Interest Sections (IS),




#### Professional Learning Networks (PLN),

4. When you see the list of communities, you can click on the community you would like to join. \*Note - The communities you have not joined yet, you will see as "View Only."




5. Once you click on the community, you will be taken to a screen to join it. Click Join/Leave This Community on the right hand side of the screen.

6. You will then be taken to your profile on TESOL.org. Under the "My Communities of Practice" tab, you should check the community or communities you would like to join or uncheck the communities you would like to leave.



7. Once you are finished, click save in the bottom right hand corner of the screen.



8. You can now go back to your profile in mytesol and access your communities of practice. You should be able to access your new communities by the next day.
