Dear Chairman Reed, Ranking Member Inhofe, Chairman Smith, and Ranking Member Rogers:

The undersigned 97 national, regional, state and local education organizations and institutions write to urge your support for the inclusion of the Biliteracy Educational Seal and Teaching (BEST) Act in the final, conferenced version of the FY23 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). Specifically, we request that the Senate agree to recede to the House NDAA's authorization of the BEST Act.

The BEST Act is a K-12 educational program which, if enacted, would have significant benefits for our nation's armed forces and all students nationwide. In the nation as a whole and within the military especially, America's language capacity has reached a breaking point. According to a 2017 American Academy of Arts and Sciences (AAAS) report, only 21.7% of US residents speak a language other than English at home and "only a fraction of this cohort speaks, reads, and comprehends a second language well enough to use it in their everyday lives." This same language deficit afflicts our military, as well, and represents a real threat to the mission of the US military. Multiple GAO studies have found that our nation's language deficit could threaten our priorities and missions around the globe.

Launched in California and now adopted in 49 states, Seal of Biliteracy programs offer significant inducements for America's K-12 students to learn another language — a seal on their diploma or transcript that shows higher education institutions, employers and even the military that they have attained proficiency in English and one other language. Over 20 years of research demonstrates that proficiency in two or more languages positively impacts academic achievement, retention rates, school attendance, graduation rates, grade point averages, rates of matriculation into post-secondary education, employability, earnings, and local and national achievement test scores. These programs have the added benefit of empowering heritage and native speakers of other languages to grow their languages and cultures. Indeed, the Congressionally commissioned AAAS report saw Seal of Biliteracy programs as an important part of the solution to the language crisis and urged states to adopt such programs.

The BEST Act, which the House passed version of NDAA would authorize, directs the Department of Education to award renewable two-year grants to states to establish or improve, and carry out, Seal of Biliteracy programs to recognize student proficiency in speaking, reading, and writing in both English and a second language. Further, BEST allows speakers of any official Native American language to use equivalent proficiency in speaking, reading, and writing in such language in lieu of proficiency in English.

For all of these reasons, we support the BEST Act and urge you to support its inclusion in the final, conferenced version of the FY23 National Defense Authorization Act.
